Working Rules and Regulations

Found recently in our archives was a paper published by the Gilmore Hinge Factory which details some rules and regulations for their workers. It constituted a contract between the company and the employee. Dated 1869, it gives some insight into the working day of blue collar America.

First off, work was a ten hour

day from 7:00 A.M. to noon and again at 1:00 P.M. to 6:00 P.M. Lunch was given for the hour in between. Second, all workers were to be at their posts and ready for work. Overseers had to be punctually in their places also. Running late? You lost pay. Thirdly, no reading or unnecessary talking was allowed.

Workers received their pay on the tenth day of the month for the previous month. They could be docked pay for poor work, and had to pay for any equipment damaged by them. If any worker left employment without giving two weeks notice, that worker forfeited a week's pay.

Don't Monday's seem a bit easier now?
