### The Station Master

Being President can be challenging at times! That was the case in January. We experienced an extreme cold spell that saw sub-zero temperatures for more than a week. One night, the mercury sank to an icy twelve below, with wind chills of thirty below!

Curator Paul Berry was checking the station one morning when he discovered that the heat had gone out. He later found a broken pipe that spurted water just as he entered the south waiting room. Paul immediately shut off the water to the station, saving us from what could have been a major disaster.

The heat wound up

quitting on us for three days. As if this wasn't enough, Paul called me one night to inform me that the door lock had broken as he was locking up. We spent a very cold time trying to repair the lock to no avail. We found another option to secure the building until a locksmith could replace the aged mechanism.

Believe it or not, some good came out of the experience. We have a commitment to protecting the station and our collections from any risks that we are able to. This includes New England winters. After a discussion with the directors, it was decided to take steps to reduce these risks. The improvements sug-

gested are: waterproof the dirt basement and cement the floor; seal up the old basement windows; install columns to support the first floor, which is showing signs of weakening in some areas; exchange the old inefficient heating system with a new forced hot air system; replace the dangerous stairs into the basement and finally, update the electrical power in the basement.

The improvements will stabilize the building and make the basement safe for storing our growing collections. It will also greatly reduce the risk of water damage, and help us to eliminate humidity problems. I will keep you informed as we progress into fundraising!

## The Curator's Corner

Hi everyone! The research committee has been meeting just about every Tuesday morning to continue identifying and organizing our archives. We have made a lot of progress, and are currently looking at our collection of newspapers. As you can probably imagine, this takes a significant amount of time. There are three buildings in Easton celebrating their 100th anniversary this year: The former North Easton Fire Station on Sullivan Avenue, the Immaculate Conception Church building on Main Street and the former Bank and Post Office Building across from the Rockery. The Children's Museum, which now occupies the old fire station, has asked us for some copies of pictures from our archives to use in their display.

We are pleased that they are sensitive to the buildings historical importance to North Easton over the years, even though the usage has drastically changed. It is a great opportunity to share some local history with the children (and adults) who utilize the building today.

## North Easton Tour Book, Historical Map Reprinted

Thanks to the generosity of the Ames Family, the North Easton Savings Bank, MacKenzie and Jeannine Smith and Stonehill College, the blue Historical Maps of Easton are being updated and printed. This is a joint project of the Easton Historical Society and the Easton Historical Commission. The map was first developed in 1975 by the Local History classes at Oliver Ames High School, and has been reprinted eight times since. However, due to printing costs, the map and data have not been updated in many years. Nevertheless, thanks to the generosity of the above named donors, the map has now been accurately updated before being printed. The maps are free, and are available at the Town Offices, Historical Society and other locations in Easton.

Robert Babineau, Society Curator Paul Berry, Edmund Hands and Hazel Varella have spent many hours on a draft using the format of the original map. They have been capably assisted by Judy Luke, who has done all the typing, and Maurice Goulet of the Department of Public Works, who has redrafted the map. Five thousand copied were printed and should be ready for distribution in late March. Once again, we wish to express our gratitude to the Ames Family, North Easton Savings Bank, MacKenzie and Jeannine Smith and Stonehill College for making this project possible. The credit for initiating the project goes to MacKenzie Smith.

A second important printing of the thirty-eight page booklet "Richardson, Olmsted, Others and the North Easton Historic Village District" has been completed. This book, known as the "Yellow Book" because of its bright yellow cover, was reprinted by the Southeastern Regional High School, and is now available at the Station. This popular, informative script describes the many buildings within the district, and also includes interesting comments from Eastoners of the time. Contributors to this booklet are Hazel Varella, Dr. Robert F. Brown, and the late Ken Jackson. Following the format of the book will allow a very nice self-guided walking tour of the North Easton Village National Historic District. Be sure to pick up a copy at the Station the next time you stop
