Each fall the Board of Directors holds a planning meeting. This past year, the group reviewed ideas for updating our mission statement to reflect the current focus of the Society. A sub-committee of the board comprised of Hazel Varella, Frank Meninno, and I took the ideas from that meeting and drafted a new mission statement, which was subsequently approved by the entire Board of Directors at our November meeting. The new mission statement encompasses all that we strive to be as a society.

## Easton Historical Society Mission Statement

The mission of the Easton Historical Society is to preserve, promote and interpret the unique industrial, social, cultural, and environmental history of the town.

- Encourage community interest in Easton's history.
- Develop educational programs for people of all ages.
- Maintain the former Old Colony Railroad Station as our headquarters and museum.
- Collect, conserve, and exhibit artifacts from our archives and collections.
- Encourage research of Easton's history.
- Work with other historical, preservation, civic, cultural, and educational organizations.

The Directors felt strongly that our mission statement include the maintenance of the Old Colony Rail Road Station, since it serves as both our home and an excellent example of work by famous Boston architect Henry Hobson Richardson. We take our responsibility to maintain this historic site very seriously, and will be creating a five year maintenance plan for the building and grounds. We will then use that plan to help seek funding to achieve the identified maintenance goals.

Throughout the mission statement is the theme of inspiring interest in our town's rich history, and special mention is made to tailoring programs to people of all ages. Our curator, Frank Meninno, has done a great job at improving the quality of our monthly open house. If you have not dropped into one of these in a while, I encourage you to visit one of our next ones. We have tailored some of our offering to Easton's youngest residents. In 2006, we held a walking tour and scavenger hunt for kids of all ages and we plan to do this again this year.

Our mission is a living statement that guides our activities. If you have thoughts on the mission statement, please stop into an open house and share them with us.

## UPCOMING EVENTS

During our Sunday, March 11th open house, Dwight Mac Kerron will present a slide show and lecture on "Hodges Tavern". The talk will begin at 2:00 P.M. Mr. Mac Kerron is a member of the Easton Historical Society as well as the current president of the Stoughton Historical Society. Hodges Tavern, later called the "old Shepherd place" by Chaffin in the "History of Easton", was located on Bay Road opposite its intersection with Randall Street. The account books of this business operation lists the names of scores of Easton residents, many of whom are mentioned by Chaffin. Included are a number of women who were engaged in the braiding of straw, making bonnets and selling their wares to Captain Samuel Hodges in exchange for store credit. These records are among the earliest in the area to document that women had their own business accounts apart from their husbands. From the time that Asa Willis is credited fifty cents for hanging up Hodges sign to the last entry in the fall of 1812, the records reveal a fascinating slice of life of scores of Easton, Sharon and Stoughton families.

Mr. Mac Kerron, the former English Department head at Newton South High School, has spent the last four years researching the journals of Henry David Thoreau, the primary documents left by Oliver Ames, his father Captain John Ames, and the emergence of the straw, shovel and cotton industries in the first decades of the nineteenth century. He lives on Ames-Long Pond in Stoughton, and his interest in the areas natural resources led him to an interest in history. Mr. Mac Kerron has given presentations to the Sharon and Stoughton Historical Societies. This presentation is made possible by a grant from the Easton Cultural Council.

Join us for a time of "Chowder and Chatter" on March 29th, 6:30 P.M. at Southeastern Regional High School. Once again, we are indebted to the generosity of Lee and Kevin Williams for underwriting the cost of this wonderful evening. This years topic is "Early Conservation Efforts in Easton", focusing especially on the 1960's. Guest panelists will be Lyn White, Alice McCarthy, John Grant and Virginia Reusch. Professor Chet Raymo will lead a small group walk on Saturday, April 28th. Professor Raymo has done some interesting walks for us over the last few years, and we are sure this one will be terrific as well. ### Early Bottled Water

Do you know that the purified bottled water craze of today actually began decades ago? Here is an early example of a green glass Simpson Spring water bottle that would have been stocked on the shelves of finer stores.

It is clearly labeled for consumer purchase. "The Simpson Spring Water" is boldly printed on the front of the paper label, along with the company name and address at South Easton. The label also states that "this water is used exclusively in the making of all Simpson Spring beverages" along with the famous line "ask for them."

On the left panel of the label is a description of the water. "Simpson Spring water is a natural Spring Water of the Purest Quality. As a Table Water it is unsurpassed. Drink freely of this water at all times in preference to ordinary water. Contents two quarts."

The panel to the right of the front label is most interesting. It lists the results of a chemical analysis dated April 6th, 1927. The water was tested by a private laboratory in Boston. The fact that the water had no color, no turbidity or odor, along with a very low iron, chlorine and nitrate content, attested to its natural spring fed purity. This led to a closing summation by the independent testers which states "The water is of excellent appearance, and free from excessive amounts of either organic or inorganic matters. It is soft and free from pollution. Dietetically, it belongs to the diuretic class of spring waters whose function is to promote the elimination of waste from the body, particularly by stimulating the action of the kidneys." That is quite a mouthful of water to swallow!

Road Trivia answers—1: Summer Street was formerly called the Littlefield Road; 2: Island Street was off of Pond Street, and led to the old shovel shop site between Shovel Shop Pond and Langwater Pond; 3: Pond Street was the old coal road; 4: Belmont Street was once known as Grove Street; 5: Jockey Lane is now South Street, between Foundry Street and Highland Street; 6: Perry Lane was off Poquanticut Avenue and led past the Perry house to the small foundry behind it. How did you do?

## SPRING BOTTLE DRIVE and SPRING CLEANING

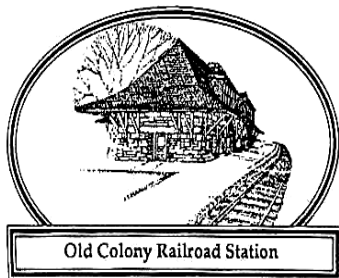
