



ORCHIDS AT CHRISTMAS

While wandering in the Ames Free Library, the 'Easton' section, of course, I discovered a lovely small book of etchings and pen and ink drawings of orchids by Blanche Ames. Included was a piece by her husband Professor Oakes Ames entitled "The Rediscovery of a Lost Orchid". Blanche's drawings, along with poems specifically chosen by Oakes, were sent out as Christmas cards by the Ameses between 1937 and 1949. The book was originally published by the Botanical Museum of Harvard University in 1975 and reprinted by the descendants of Blanche and Oakes Ames in 2007. Below is one of Blanche's drawings and the poem that accompanied it. What a creative and wonderful idea. Borderland was built in 1910 and I can imagine many places on the estate where flowers might grow in 'crannies'. Blanche's love for orchids and the natural world is illustrated here,

Flower in the crannied wall,
I pluck you out of the crannies; —
Hold you here, root and all, in my hand,
Little flower—but if I could understand
What you are, root and all, and all in all,
I should know what God and man is.

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In Memoriam

John F. "Jack" Hurley, 99, a resident of Easton for the past 55 years, passed away peacefully surrounded by his loving family on November 16, 2022, after a brief illness. Jack was 6 days shy of celebrating his 100th birthday. Jack was raised and educated in Stoughton and attended Bridgewater State College. He was the manager and operator of the family farm, Hurley's Dairy, for several years. Jack enlisted in the United States Navy during WWII, serving as Motor Machinist Mate Second Class aboard the USS LCS(L)(3)63, a landing craft support ship based in the Pacific. After being honorably discharged, he enrolled in the engineering program at Wentworth Institute of Technology.

Jack was employed by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts for 36 years as an Assistant Chief Engineer for the State Highway Division. His work history included construction work on Defense projects, performing highway surveys, highway construction supervision, and traffic engineering. He worked as a consultant for several private highway engineering firms before fully retiring.

A life member of both the American Legion Post 7 and the Knights of Columbus Council 238 of Easton, Jack was also a member of St. Vincent de Paul Society. He was an avid fisherman and expert cribbage player, and he never missed a "scrumptious" meal. He will always be remembered for his engaging smile, positive outlook, and outgoing personality. Nothing made him happier than spending time with his family and friends.

Jack is survived by his children, John C. Hurley and his wife Carol of Easton, Timothy V. Hurley and his partner Lori of Easton, Eileen M. Hurley and her partner Glenn of Gardner, Paul D. Hurley and his wife Kelley of Easton, and Maureen A. Willard and her husband John of Easton; a sister, Virginia Nolan of West Bridgewater; 15 grandchildren, 17 great-grandchildren; a son-in-law Joe Peters; several nieces, nephews, and cousins. He was the father of the late Katharine F. Peters and brother of the late Mary Maloney and Charles L. Hurley. Jack also leaves behind many dear friends at the Residence, where he enjoyed the last 7 years of his life. Of note, Jack's son, Tim, is a newly elected Director of the Easton Historical Society.

Bonny L. Luke, long time resident of Easton, passed away peacefully at home surrounded by her family on November 18, 2022. She was the loving wife of the late James Luke. Bonny was born in Norwood on August 19, 1953 to the late Walter and Marjorie (MacKinnon) Greeley.

Bonny worked for the Easton public school system for over 30 years. She was much loved by the community. She was known for her generosity and free giving nature. Bonny donated to numerous charities throughout her life, but her greatest joy was giving items of need to kids and families in the Easton area and beyond. She enjoyed cooking and would put out an entire spread of homemade delights for football games and other events at the school. Bonny never forgot a birthday and had a knack for choosing the perfect gift for her recipients. She was selfless and caring towards everyone.

She loved animals, especially her pets. She enjoyed crossword puzzles, game shows and scratch tickets. Whenever she won on a scratch ticket, she would gift it to whomever she thought could use it. Her greatest pride in life was her family - she was very proud of each and every one of them.
