the local cable channel.


### ANNOUNCING A SPECIAL SOCIETY TRIP!

The Easton Historical Society has arranged for members and friends the unique opportunity to tour an extraordinary Victorian house, the Governor Henry Lippitt House, in Providence, Rhode Island. An article by John Loring in <u>Architectural Digest</u> states that there is "probably no other house in New England that better represents the expansive 1860's than the Governor Henry Lippitt House, atop College Hill...No house has survived that can match it for the importance and quality of architecture and interior design". This historic house—museum is now the property of Preserve Rhode Island.

The trip is planned for Saturday, May 31st. Due to parking complications in the area, the tour will be by van leaving the Easton Historical Society, the former Old Colony Railroad Station, at 9:15 A.M. and returning by 1:00 P.M.
