
Two Special Appearances

Keeping Our History Alive in the Classroom

One of the highlights of our year is the annual visits from Easton schoolchildren. Over the years a number of programs have been offered to students. At one time, 5th grade walking tours were an important part of learning local history. Today, many adults who visit fondly recall those tours. In more recent years, we have had the opportunity to work with our 2nd graders. Each year, students from Center School, Moreau Hall, and Parkview School come to learn about their town's history. They are treated to three things when they arrive: a show and tell presentation at the Society, a walking tour through the Ames Shovel Works, and a walking tour of the Veteran's Memorial Park. Other stops may include looking at the H. H. Richardson designed Oakes Ames Memorial Hall and the Ames Free Library, and F. L. Olmsted's Rockery and the original 1895 Oliver Ames High School. Ed Hands, Hazel Varella, Leon Lombardi, Nancy Deluca, Joanne England and I have made presentations or served as tour guides. The students are very inquisitive and ask excellent questions. We try to connect Easton's history to their neighborhoods when we can, and sometimes those opportunities come through the questions they ask. Over the course of the years many return to the Society and remind me that they visited with their class. I always ask them what they enjoyed most about their visit. Their responses help us to refine what we do, so we can better serve future students. You might wonder if 2nd graders are all that interested in history. They certainly are! They retain a lot of what they hear and see when they are with us. To their credit, and to the credit of the 2nd grade teachers, these students are well behaved and well prepared for their visit. At the end of the day all of us who have helped remark about how enjoyable a day it has been for us!

Our 8th grade students participate in National History Day each year. Sometimes their project contains a connection to Easton, and when possible, we encourage them to learn about that and include it in their research. Easton had another strong showing, with many students going on to State level competition. This year Easton will send five students to the National History Day finals in Maryland! They (and their projects) are Jessica Roa - Apollo 11: One Giant Leap for Peace (Individual Documentary); Olivia Pierce - The 1964-1965 World's Fair- It's Not A Small World After All (Individual Exhibit); Meg Holleran and Olivia Carroll - The Polio Epidemic of 1952: An Encounter With Death (Group Documentary); Diana Binney - An Exploration of the Discovery of Penicillin and the Exchange of Ideas Leading to the Exploration of Antibiotics (Historical Paper). We are happy to support and encourage these students and wish them a great experience. We are proud of all the students who participate, and thank the Easton schools for continuing to support this program. We wish all of them a successful trip and a great learning experience!

Also this year, we met with several Oliver Ames High School juniors who have been working on Honors Program history papers. They made several visits to the Society to talk with us and gather information on their subjects. Some of the things studied are the economic and social impacts that the Ames Shovel Works made in Easton and the career of Governor Oliver Ames. David Ames and I met with two students from Southeastern Regional Vocational Technical High School as well who were researching how the railroads affected the Ames Shovel Works and the Ames family. This marks the first time that we have had students from this school and we hope this will continue. Special appreciation goes to Nicole Casper, archivist at Stonehill College, for connecting these students with us.

We continually look for ways to support our students both at the local school level and in higher education. Our Educational Liaison Matt Auger does a great job keeping us informed and involved. Thank you, Matt!


Celebrating 25 Years of Serving Children

Our August 14th open house will take a look at recipes used by Anna C. Ames, wife of Governor Oliver Ames. She was very involved in hosting dinners and celebrations for her family in Easton, and at their home in Boston. She was a very capable cook, making challenging recipes without the conveniences of a modern kitchen. We will do our best to recreate a few of these recipes for your culinary curiosity.

Our First Olympian?

Americans are preparing to compete in this year's Summer Olympics in Brazil. As you know, there are four Olympians with an Easton connection: ice hockey goaltenders James Craig and Scott Gordon, swimmer Eric Vendt, and rower John Everett (a highly decorated world champion in his sport, 1976 Olympian, and chosen for the 1980 Summer Olympics that the USA boycotted). Did you know there was another Eastoner who is connected with the Olympics?

Back in the 1890's Baron Pierre de Coubertin of France (1863-1937) began a movement to bring back the Olympic Games, and through his steady urging and constant support, they were brought back in April of 1896, appropriately held in Athens, Greece. The American team consisted of a small band of male athletes and a few coaches. Many of them were members of the Boston Athletic Association. They were responsible for raising their own support. Public interest in the Olympics was more of a curiosity to most Americans, and support was slow in coming. Just before it was time for the American team to embark, they found themselves short of cash, and it looked as though the whole trip might not happen.


Society volunteer Courtney Saraf came across an article first published in a magazine a few years ago that shed some light on who came to the rescue! It appears that members of the B.A.A. and perhaps the first American Olympic Committee contacted former Massachusetts Governor Oliver Ames to help in last minute fund-raising. He made a few calls, and the last of the financial needs were met. Governor Ames died in November 1895, and this may have been his last, and perhaps greatest legacy. The American team was wildly successful and interest in the Olympics grew quickly.

More research will be done over the summer and hopefully a more complete story will appear in the next newsletter. In the mean time, let's give three cheers to our Easton Olympians and for this year's Olympic team as they compete for the top prize in all of sports—an Olympic medal!

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Very Informative and Enjoyable Open Houses

On January 10th William Ames discussed the history of the Hobart Ames Plantation in Grand Junction, Tennessee. He showed the video he produced of his visit there which documented the fascinating interior of the main house and the extraordinary wallpaper in one of the rooms. The extensive land and the location of the annual National Field Trials for bird dogs were very impressive. The role of Hobart's widow Julia in facilitating the transfer and funding was little known until Bill's presentation. Bill is at right holding a book on the Ames Plantation, which is in our collection and can be read at the Society.



On February 14th Ross Muscato shared his memories of Jim Craig growing up in Easton and his eventual successes. Jim's recent book <u>Gold Medal Strategies</u> was the source of some of the shared information. On display were many of the early trophies in Jim's amazing career in addition to the rocking chair he was given by the Town of Easton. Leo McEvoy, who had witnessed two of the 1980 Olympic Games, shared his memories in addition to the importance of Jim's family to the goaltender.

On March 13th cookbooks and recipes were the topic. Amazingly several Easton organizations have prepared cookbooks including women's clubs, church organizations, and the Easton Historical Society. Featured were a number of cookbooks and utensils that once belonged to Enis Lawson Almquist. Also displayed were many of the menus of early Easton restaurants. Thank you to Patricia Baker, Joanne England, Edmund Hands, and Frank Meninno for their delicious food prepared from early recipes for the March Open House on early cookbooks.

April 7th was the 17th annual "Chowder and Chatter" funded as always by Lee and Kevin Williams and was the idea of Dr. Robert Misiewicz. Last year the focus was OAHS Girls' Sports; this year Boys'. Panelists Robert "Buddy" Wooster (1940s), James Elson (1950s), Robert Clary (1960's) and Robert Wooster, Jr. (1970's) describe four decades of outstanding athletics; Edmund Hands was the effective moderator. May was bottle month as the Society featured an exhibit of old bottles from our collection and a private collection on the 15th. Many Easton bottles were featured dating back to the 1850's. At our Annual Meeting on May 22nd, William Rose, OAHS Class of 1969 and President of the Little Rhody Bottle Club, gave an illustrated talk about digging for and collecting bottles. He brought many interesting examples from his own extensive collection, and shared anecdotes and tips about antique bottles. Values and how to date bottles were discussed. After the talk he took the time to answer questions and look at bottles that attendees brought.



On April 7th the Society held our 17th annual "Chowder and Chatter" evening. This tasty event, the creation of Dr. Robert F. Misiewicz, and funded by the generosity of Lee and Kevin Williams, features a delicious dinner followed by a panel discussion.
