## Queset Open House!

Here is an opportunity you don't want to pass up. Queset, an historical Ames home situated behind the Ames Free Library on Main Street, will be open to the public on Sunday, September 29th, from 1-4 P.M. Light refreshments will be served.

Designed in the style of Andrew Jackson Downing and built in 1854, the house was home to the family of Oakes Angier Ames. It was enlarged in the 1870's by architect and Life magazine founder John Ames Mitchell. Theatrical producer Winthrop Ames lived in the house from the early 1900's into the 1930's. Recently the house has come under the ownership of Forest Systems Inc., who have been busy restoring the exterior of the home. This important fundraiser offers the rare chance to see one of Easton's great architectural treasures up close and personal.

Parking is available around the Rockery, Main Street and at the shovel complex across from Queset house.

### Boston Post Cane In Easton Again!

Many years ago, in 1904, the old Boston Post newspaper gave a commemorative cane to many of the cities and towns in Massachusetts. The cane became an icon and was to be awarded to the oldest male citizen of each of the respective communities.

Easton received one of these canes. One of the earliest Eastoners to have the cane was the great grandfather of Edwin C. White.

Unfortunately, many of the canes, including Easton's, have been lost or destroyed. It was last seen some fifty years ago. Record keeping was poor and as a result many of the recipients are unknown.

All is not lost, however. Through the remarkable generosity of the North Easton Savings Bank, a long time community supporter

and friend of the Society, a reproduction of the cane is once again in Easton. In fact, there are two of them! Bank President Thomas A. Deubler presented one of the canes to the Easton Board of Selectmen on August 19th, 2002. The other cane will be on permanent loan to the Easton Historical Society. It will be used for special bank and historical events. Many thanks to the North Easton Savings Bank for making this possible. More information will be available in upcoming newsletters.

Do you have any Boston Post cane memories? Do you remember any of the recipients? We would love to set the record straight! If you have any information on Easton's old Boston Post cane, please drop us a note. It sure would be nice to recover some of this lost history.

Easton was once a cow town!
The Ames family developed the Langwater Guernsey in the early 1900's. Thirty years earlier, the Ames family bred Ayrshires. A letter from Fred L.
Ames, dated June 29, 1870, attests to the pedigree of a bull calf. It reads:
Pedigree of Ayrshire bull calf sent by me to L. L. Berry at Greene Me in April 1869.
Color Red White
Calved April 8, 1869
Bred by Fred L. Ames, No.
Easton, Mass
Sire—Bristol No 104 Ayrshire
Herd Book
Dame—Nancy No 652 Ayrshire
Herd Book
The parents of the calf were thoroughbred Ayrshires and I believe above pedigree to be true and correct in every particular.
