What began as a (seemingly) simple idea of bringing the ceiling back to its former glory soon grew into an opportunity to refinish floors, repair walls, paint, and update the ladies bathroom. That led us to rethinking the best use of the space that has been given us. It was decided to use the Ladies Waiting Room as a multi-functional area with the flexibility to set up for groups, classes or displays. We feel that we can now make better use of this wonderful space.

The bulk of the work was done by master carpenter Tim Hurley of North Easton who has had lots of experience in renovating historic structures. North Easton architect Jay Thomas willingly lent his expertise when needed. Electrical work was performed by David Anderson Electric of South Easton. Plumbing was provided by Bart Carlson of North Easton. The floors were refinished by Tam's Hardwood Floors of North Easton. Framing and hanging of maps and artwork were performed by Jim Inman of the J. Inman Gallery of Easton. James Carlino added valuable assistance with color and placement of items. Muscle to move items was provided by Dominic and Anthony Meninno. The Society is very grateful for all the assistance provided to us!

Of course, we are very grateful for the donors who made this long-awaited transformation possible. Announcing our New 2011 Holiday Ornament "Unity Close"—Home of Oliver Ames, Jr.



The Easton Historical Society is pleased to announce our ninth annual glass holiday ornament: Unity Close at Christmas as photographed by John Ventresco. John is an award winning photographer who operates Starlight Studio in South Easton. Unity Close was built in 1863 for Oliver Ames, Jr. It was later the home of Mr. and Mrs. William A. Parker. The house, which has been lovingly restored by the current owners, is a true Easton landmark, and an integral part of the history of the Ames family and the North Easton Village National Historic District. The ornament depicts the house with candle lit windows, a heartwarming, familiar sight each winter in Easton.

Photos at right show the condition of the walls and ceiling prior to restoration. The white paint was removed revealing a fine oak ceiling. Peeling and chipped plaster was repaired.

Sixty Years Ago On

September 27th, 1951...

The Easton Historical Society presented a play at the Frothingham Memorial Hall titled "Life in Easton Years Ago" written by Amory Parker and Mrs. Graham (Ruth) Smith. The Historical Society, the Ames Free Library / Easton's Public Library and the Oakes Ames Memorial Hall are going to re-enact this unique script. If weather permits, the performance will be on the stage at Queset Gardens, located directly behind the Library. If the weather is not appropriate, Frederick Ames has offered to host the production in the Oakes Ames Memorial Hall. The program will be held from 3 to 5 P.M. on Saturday, September 24th—almost sixty years to the date! Due to the seating capacity of the hall, in case of inclement weather, only one hundred reservations will be available for a donation of \$20 for each reservation. These will go on sale at the main desk of the Ames Free Library on Tuesday, September 6th at 10 A.M. Payment is accepted by cash, check or credit card. Several changes or additions will occur from the original script. There will be an additional scene at the end with representatives of the original donors of the H. H. Richardson Old Colony Station to the Society commenting on their experiences at the rededication of the Station November 7th, 2009. These will be Mrs. David Ames, Mrs. Oliver F. Ames, Charlton H. Ames, and Frances DeLacvivier, grand-daughter of Mr. William Parker. They will be sharing these reminiscences with Mrs. Graham Smith's son MacKenzie. Also, instead of a quartet singing at the end, the music will be sing-a-longs of popular songs by the audience led by Patricia Ann Baker, daughter of Lawrence and Olive Gurney, who were in the original production. Wine and cheese will be served under the direction of Mrs. Joan Lundgren either at Queset House (if we hold the event at the Queset Gardens) or at the Oakes Ames Memorial Hall following the re-enactment. You may wish to bring your own folding chairs if the event is held at Queset Gardens.

A Different Perspective of Growing Up at Sheep Pasture

As a small child in North Easton, I roamed far and wide through the various Ames estates, sometimes Queset House, more often Langwater, but mostly Sheep Pasture, although I thought of it as "the woods" or the Parkers'. In the spring, when there were daffodils everywhere, I helped myself to large bouquets, bringing them home to my mother and sometimes putting them in water with food coloring to see the delicate edges take on the color of the water.

One time, in the spring of 1950 or '51, my thievery was exposed when Mrs. Parker herself came out of the little red house and caught me red-handed. She asked me why I was picking her flowers, and I replied that I was taking them home to my mother. She asked me if I liked flowers, and I answered in the affirmative, so she kindly let me take them and sent me on my way.

A few days later, Mrs. Parker called my house. When she announced who she was, my mother was mortified, thinking "what has Wayne done now?" Instead of reporting my crime, Mrs. Parker told my mother about our earlier conversation and my love of flowers and asked my mother if she could come by the next day to take me to see the exotic flowers in the Langwater greenhouses belonging to her uncle, John S. Ames, at the time, president of the Massachusetts Horticultural Society. My mother, relieved that I wasn't about to be sent to the reformatory, of course said "yes."

Mrs. Parker showed me flowers unheard of in the woods of Easton, like orchids, bromeliads, and cactuses. I was thrilled. The only disappointment that day was that Mrs. Parker picked me up in her small ordinary car and not the Bentley I'd seen her driving sometimes.

And that was the last contact I had with Mrs. Parker for a quarter of a century. In 1977, while I was living in Hawaii, my mother sent me a copy of <u>Growing Up at Sheep Pasture</u>, Mrs. Parker's memoir told to Mrs. Hazel Varella of the Easton Historical Society. I really enjoyed reading it and seeing the old pictures of a Sheep Pasture that I never knew since the mansion itself was long-gone by the time I roamed the estate.

I sent a short letter to Mrs. Parker recounting the above adventure and was surprised to receive a reply a short time later. One thing I'd noticed in reading the book was that Mrs. Parker's eighty-fifth birthday would be next month, August 14th, 1977, so I decided to send her a gift. A few days before her birthday, I sent her a dozen Hawaiian anthuriums with a card wishing her a happy day and many more to follow.

True to form, Mrs. Parker sent another gracious note to thank me for the flowers. I thought of them as partial payment for all the daffodils stolen the decades before.

Society Announces New Publication! - Reminiscences, Volume Two

Because the response to the first volume of <u>Reminiscences</u> was so complimentary, the Research Committee is sharing more of the fascinating stories of our community that exist in the archives of the Easton Historical Society. Various sections of Easton have their own unique history, and hopefully you will enjoy reliving some of the narrators' experiences (except for the trolley accident).

Industry has been an important component of early Easton, and the first article focuses on the largest employer, the Ames Shovel Company. A recently found article written in 1936 by an unknown author provides insight into the production changes and evolution of the Company. Later in this volume, you will read Mrs. David Ames' (Elizabeth M. Ames) informative recollections of some of the Ames family members living during the 1930's to the 1950's.

Our Civil War expert, Edmund Hands, has provided a fascinating narration of David Ambrose Middleton. Son of Irish immigrants, he worked at the Shovel Company and served the Union during the Civil War. Ed's extensive research focuses on an aspect of the Civil War which is rarely mentioned, the role of the United States Navy. Travel the high seas as you read about the experiences of David, who apparently deserted the army for the navy.

Enjoy the childhood memories of two Easton ladies who grew up about the same time period, Anna Buck and Enid J, Kavka. However, Anna was living in Poquanticut, and Enid in North Easton. Anna's descriptions are so lengthy that only the first part is included in this volume. Enid was "Miss Easton" in the bicentennial celebration of Easton (1925), when she was still unmarried and using her maiden name Enid Jacobson, and we have included a picture of her in the 1975 parade—still a charming person. Childhood memories for the next generation living in North Easton usually involved Frothingham Memorial Park. Jacques Harlow and Joseph Connolly's reminiscences recall the significance of the Park during its first two decades.

Folklore is always part of a community. In Furnace Village, one of the most popular legends involves Billy Rock. The next time you drive by Old Pond on Routes 123 and 106 and have time to stop, see if you can view Billy Rock.

The areas of Eastondale and South Easton are involved in the trolley accident of October 27, 1921 as described by Ruth Melindy Reynolds. Also, Edwin White, who was President of Simpson Spring, grew up in Eastondale. Ed's early memories in relation to Simpson Spring are effectively described in his informative article about the oldest bottling company still on its original location. Industry, particularly in the winter, was also important in Unionville. Articles written by John Kent and Diane Carr capture the essence of Fred Monte's ice-cutting business on Elm Street.

Oliver Ames High School educators provide great memories for those who attended one of the three OA's. Two generations of teachers are identified by Hazel Varella: those who were inspirational at the middle of the twentieth century, and those of the next generation hired by 1969, with success culminating in a White House Rose Garden ceremony in 1985. (All high school teachers gratefully acknowledge the excellent education provided to the students at the elementary level.) A list of the educators recognized by the Easton Jaycees and the Easton Lions Club has been included.

Conservation has been a major endeavor during the past half century. Many have contributed, and certainly one of the pioneers was Clifford G. "Kippy" Grant. His friend Duncan B. Oliver has written a tribute to this far-sighted naturalist.

We conclude with the restoration of the south waiting room in 2011. A special opening was held June 18th. Enjoy the pictures and visit! The Society is open the second Sunday of each month except May (the third Sunday).

The Society is deeply indebted to Daniel P. Pare, who not only prepared all the materials for this publication but also edited what was appropriate. Newspaper articles were not changed except for some minor typos.
