Member News and Milestones

The Society has a new Corresponding Secretary! He is Mr. Curtis H. "Curt" Chase. Curts' first exposure to Easton came as a child during the 1940's, when his grandfather took him on train trips from Boston to North Easton. "I can still remember the huge steam locomotive, walking around North Easton center, the ducks on the pond near Queset and the hammering noises coming from the shovel shop buildings. On another trip I remember hiking through the woods with a

friend and his dad to see "King Phillip's Cave" on the grounds of Stonehill College." Curts grandfather was a bread man for Hastings Bakery, later Hathaways Bakery. After his retirement, he would often retrace his route through Easton on Sundays, following the roads he once covered in a horse drawn pung and later a bread truck.

Mr. Chase graduated from Stonehill College and enlisted in the army in 1966. Following his discharge he settled in Easton. Since then he has remained a resident and member of the Historical Society. He recently retired after thirty-two years as a teacher, and was looking for a way to devote some of his time to volunteer work. When the directors found out about his interest in serving as our corresponding secretary the offer was made to him. Curt accepted, and the Society is grateful for his help. Welcome Curt!

Spotlight on History

"You Poisoned My Cow!"

From the archives of the Society:

To the Hon. Board of Selectmen of Easton, Mass.

South Easton, August 31st, 1903

Dear Sir, I herewith enclose bill for cow, which died July 9th 1903 "Town of Easton ...for one cow believed to have died from poison. \$55.00"

from poison taken from eating grass under elm trees after being sprayed with a solution of arsenic and lead. The Veterinary that was called Dr. Fahey, found symptoms of poison and doctored for same. The post mortem examination found inflammation caused by eating some irritant (believed to have been poison). Resp. Yours, Chas. W. Hill."

The town paid him \$55.00!


Easton became a town on December 21, 1725.
