

A Taxing History

Taxes have been a part of our history since, well, recorded history. There is no escaping them. Our best defense for them is to pay them on time.

A review of some old Easton tax records brought some interesting items to light. Among them is a list of the twenty-five highest taxpayers for the year 1853.

1853 was a time of peace and prosperity, and a time of growth and discovery. Represented here are industrialists, politicians, doctors, businessmen and well-to-do farmers. Many are well established and recognizable families. They come from all areas of the town. Here then, for your perusal, is the twenty-five taxpayers and the amounts they paid.

E.J.W. Morse is listed twice, once as a business owner and again for his personal holdings.

The Ames' family appeared to put their personal fortunes and homes under the auspices of the Ames company, resulting in the huge disparity between the first two taxpayers and the rest of the list.
