Curator's Corner - Curator / Caretaker Frank T. Meninno

I have seen a great many brownies lately... make that Brownies, and Junior Girl Scouts and Cub Scouts too! Over the past few weeks I have had the privilege of sharing Easton's history with these wonderful children. They are always eager to learn, and boy are they ever full of questions! As soon as they enter the building, one of the children will begin to ask why the waiting room doors say "men" or "women", leading to a discussion on old time customs. From there, anything goes! I usually pick out several items to pass around. The most popular of these is one of the small Revolutionary War cannon balls made in Easton. Another popular activity is to have the children "model" old items of clothing. These are great items from our past that they can touch, which makes it all very real.

One of the things that is important is to tell the kids something about the part of town they live in. I show them photos from around Easton, beginning with the former Dean mill which gives me the chance to talk about South Easton and Eastondale being the oldest settled part of town. From there we discuss Simpson Spring and the Morse car. The Ames family and their contributions to Easton's and America's history are discussed. When we get to Furnace Village, I show a photo of a trolley car going through the Five Corners. No one ever guesses the location of that photo since so much has changed. Boy are the kids (and parents) surprised to find out what great history we have here. Hopefully they will leave with a new appreciation for their town and their neighborhood!

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
HOLIDAY RAFFLE—1855 MAP OF EASTON!


An anonymous donor has given a very special item for our holiday raffle—an original 1855 colored map of the Town of Easton! This wonderful map is the first of the maps produced for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Bristol County Atlas sets (the others were done on 1872 and 1895). It is a rare item and is in very good condition. The map size is 36" x 27". It is mounted on a heavy canvas backing, and can be either hung by its original wood hangers or framed.

The 1855 map is one of the earliest maps to denote the locations of houses in town along with the names of the owners. Also listed on the map are the locations of public buildings such as school houses and cemeteries. The school districts are also outlined, and sections of the map are hand colored. A detail of the North Easton village is included in the lower left hand corner. You will be surprised at the detail included on the map. We do not know how many of these maps were produced, but to see a map of this age in this condition is a real treat. There is some age-related cracking but the map is intact.

You have an opportunity to win this map. Tickets for this very rare item are priced at \$5.00 each, or 3 for \$10.00. The donor has asked that the proceeds be divided evenly between the Easton Historical Society and the Ames Free Library—Easton's Public Library. We are happy to be a part of this great opportunity, and express our gratitude to the donor for the generosity shown to us.

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OLD HOUSES and BUILDINGS of EASTON

Dean Mill, c. 1750—2010

A sad event took place this past October when South Easton lost a most venerable landmark: the former J. O. Dean Mill. Although efforts were made to save the building by relocating it to another spot on the property, the deal to save it fell victim to the failure to obtain necessary zoning variances on the property. Easton had allocated money from the Community Preservation Act to purchase preservation restrictions on the mill, but was unable to consummate the deal. The site at the corner of Washington and Depot Streets is now void of any structure for the first time in over 300 years.

Clement Briggs built a grain mill around 1700, just about on the same site as the Dean Mill. It stood next to the saw mill erected before 1700 by the Randalls. After Briggs's death, the mill was sold to Timothy Cooper in February 1723. By 1729 Ephraim Randall owned it, and after that, his son Timothy Randall took ownership. The old mill was razed and a new one built in 1750, by Robert Ripley who was a carpenter. In 1803 the mill passed into the partnership formed by Ichabod Macomber and Cyrus Alger.

After a lawsuit over water privileges was settled, the property was owned by Josiah Copeland, Bezer Keith, Calvin Brett and James Guild. Later it was again sold to Joseph Hayward, Roland Howard, Josiah Copeland and Elijah Howard, Jr., and was operated under the name of Elijah Howard and Co. A small forge was erected on the dam next to the mill, but proved unsuccessful. That building later housed the Ross Heel Company. In 1840 Barzillai Dean purchased the mill. After his death it passed to his son Thomas H. Dean and then to his brother John O. Dean. It stayed in the Dean and Howard family until the 1980's. In recent years it was run as a small garden and landscape center.

The grain business was a good one. In 1872 Lucian Bonney was hired to build a large addition on the north side of the mill. In 1900 another addition was built ten feet wide, and was added to the south side of the building, and the third floor was added. This work was done by Joseph Baldwin. An elevator was also installed at that time.

The current owners of the property had plans to move the mill off the dam and use it for office space. Instead a car wash will occupy the corner near Washington and Depot Streets. Unfortunately the plans to save the building fell apart, and Easton lost its oldest surviving mill and the last direct connection to our first settlers.

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
Society Receives Donation for Restoration

Preservation Massachusetts has awarded their very first "Community Spirit" award to the members of the "Friends of the Historic Ames Shovel Works in North Easton". The award "recognizes the hard work, dedication and commitment of local groups to preservation within our communities", Preservation Massachusetts said.

The Friends group was formed in October 2008 when developers threatened to demolish the former Ames Shovel Shop complex. The group of many people, led by president David Ames, Jr., William, Fred and Oliver Ames, along with treasurer Lee Williams, worked with architects and consultants to develop a workable plan to reuse the site in an historically sensitive manner. Much of this plan is being utilized by Beacon Communities Development in their current plans to convert the factories to housing while preserving the historic integrity of the site and the surrounding neighborhood. David Ames recognized the efforts of the many people who were involved. "It's an award that belongs to a lot of people", he stated. "We're obviously very pleased."

Preservation Massachusetts, best known for their annual list of "America's 11 Most Endangered Historic Places", included the Ames site in their 2009 list.

The Easton Historical Society extends congratulations to the Friends for receiving this extraordinary and well deserved recognition!
